The Miranda warning (often shortened to Miranda , or Mirandizing a suspect) is the name of the formal warning that is required to be given by law enforcement in the United States to criminal suspects in police custody (or in a custodial situation) before they are interrogated, in accordance with the Miranda ruling. Missouri v.
